#### PRELUDE

#### **RINGING OF BELL**

#### READING: 2 Kings 2:1-12

When the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent."

Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."

Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.

When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

Reader: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

People: Thanks be to God

#### PSALM: 50:1-6

- 2 Out of Zion, perfect in its beauty, \* God reveals Godself in glory.

- 3 Our God will come and will not keep silence; \* before God there is a consuming flame, and round about God a raging storm.
- 4 God calls the heavens and the earth from above \* to witness the judgment of God's people.
- 5 "Gather before me my loyal followers, \* those who have made a covenant with me and sealed it with sacrifice."
- 6 Let the heavens declare the rightness of God's cause; \* for God is the judge.

#### GOSPEL: Mark 9:2-9

Reader: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to MARK. People: **Glory to you, Lord Christ.** 

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. Reader: The Gospel of the Lord. People: **Praise to you, Lord Christ.**

Still, we engage in confession, acknowledging to God all that rests uneasily in our hearts. Confident of God's love, let us make our confession now, first in silent prayer.

#### Silence

**PRAYER OF CONFESSION** (let us pray together):

Gracious and loving God, open our hearts so that we are able to admit to you the fullness of our lives—that which is beautiful and that which is hurtful and hateful.

We confess that we do not follow Jesus in all that we do. We love with condition.

We destroy your creation.

We judge and condemn.

We cast the first stone and keep the log in our own eye. We do not always turn to you as the source of our healing. We believe you have the power to turn us around to a more abundant way of life, so we ask that you do that. We ask that you give us the energy, empathy, patience, and imagination to be your people in all we say and do. Amen

#### HOLY COMMUNION

<i>Celebrant</i>	God is with you.
People	<b>And also with you.</b>
<i>Celebrant</i>	Lift up your hearts.
People	<b>We lift them to God.</b>
<i>Celebrant</i>	Let us give thanks to God.
People	It is right to give our thanks and praise.

<u>Celebrant</u>: It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Loving God. By water and the Holy Spirit, you have made us a new people in Jesus Christ, to show forth your glory in all the world. Therefore, we praise you, joining our voices with every nameless and unremembered child of God, and with all the company of heaven, singing:

Holy and gracious God: You made us in your infinite love, and when we turned away from that love, you sent Jesus Christ to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, and to draw us near to you.

On the night he was given over to suffering and death, Jesus took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

#### The Celebrant continues:

Recalling now Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection, we gather at this table with bread and wine in celebration of life and love, work, play and rest, the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and Her presence in our lives. Send your Spirit upon these gifts. Let them be for us the Body and Blood of Christ. And grant that we who eat this bread and drink this cup may be filled with your life and goodness. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty God, now and forever. AMEN.

Our God, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name Thy kindom come, thy will be done On earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread And forgive us our trespasses As we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, But deliver us from evil. 

# **BLACK HISTORY MONTH**

## Celebrating the life of Rev. Pauli Murray



"Seeing the relationship between my personal cause and the universal cause of freedom released me from a sense of isolation, helped me to rid myself of vestiges of shame over my racial history, and gave me an unequivocal understanding that equality of treatment was my birthright and not something to be earned. I would be no less afraid to challenge the system of racial segregation, but the heightened significance of my cause would impel me to act in spite of my fears." - Pauli Murray

A descendant of a North Carolina enslaved woman and an enslaver, Pauli Murray was an early civil rights activist and the first African American female priest ordained in the Episcopal Church. She graduated from Hunter College in 1933 and was denied entry to the all-white University of North Carolina School of Law due to her race. The following year, she was denied entry to Harvard Law School due to her gender. She graduated from Howard University Law School in 1944 and earned a master's degree in law from UC Berkeley and a doctorate in juridical science from Yale University. She was a founding member of the National Organization for Women (NOW) and saw the civil rights struggle and the women's movement as intertwined. After the death of her life partner, she entered General Theological Seminary and was ordained at the National Cathedral in 1977. She was called to the Church of the Atonement in Washington, D.C. from 1979 to 1981 and then to Holy Nativity Church in Baltimore until she died in 1985. She is a poet and scholar, publishing *States' Laws on Race and* Color (1951); her family story, Proud Shoes: Story of an American *Family* (1955); *Dark Testament and Other Poems* (1970); and her memoir, Song in a Weary Throat: An American Pilgrimage (1987).



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
